







Dear Friends,

Another year of learning to adjust with constantly changing expectations and needs has come and gone. Rather than seeing this challenge as a frustration, we have approached it like an opportunity for innovation and development. I am excited for the lessons learned and the potential that this year has left us with for the future, whether that future includes travel limitations and lockdowns or not.

We experimented with formats of delivering our community resourcing program to find out what works best for our diverse partners within the limitations to access that we faced. We walked closely with our coalition member organizations as they worked to make the same kind of adjustments and provided coaching, introductions to new partners and funders, and funneled more resources into the community. At the same time, we saw our community grow, and we are now approaching 30 organizations across Indonesia collaborating together for freedom!

In many ways, *this past year has been about laying a strong foundation for the future* that is so different than what we expected a couple of years ago. As we look toward 2022, we know that we are well prepared with a stronger donor network and projects that have been intentionally and carefully created and adjusted to meet the needs of our community as they exist now.

Thank you to each person who has partnered with us to strengthen and equip those on the frontlines of anti-human trafficking across Indonesia. We are seeing the impact that a connected, well-resourced collaborative community can make!

The gap between researchers, the public, and the people engaged in anti-trafficking efforts within Indonesia is a barrier to publishing accurate, current data and developing data-backed strategies targeted toward combating human trafficking within the country. It also reduces the amount of private and government funding allocated to the issue.

Dark Bali participates in research and media efforts, translates data into Indonesian, and serves as a liaison between our local partners and English-speaking stakeholders. Our Indonesian and international advocacy and awareness projects educate the public and bring new attention to the needs of victims and those supporting them.

## TIP REPORT DATA

Dark Bali continues to gather trafficking data among our coalition partners for the US State Department's annual Trafficking in Persons Report, ensuring that researchers and governments have a more accurate understanding of trafficking patterns in Indonesia.

**Through our growing relationship with the US State Department, we were delighted to host a webinar with the US Consul of Surabaya to introduce the TIP Report and to facilitate new relationships between the grassroots anti-trafficking community in Indonesia and the US State Department.**

## COLLABORATION

*Establishing partnerships, coordinating collaborative projects, and connecting organizations with one another*

Human trafficking is a complicated crime requiring a multitude of criminal actors who groom, recruit, transfer, harbor, and control their victims. The only effective response to trafficking is a network equally as sophisticated and working collaboratively together.

Dark Bali strengthens and equips the national Indonesian abolitionist network and amplifies the voices of Indonesian caregivers, policy makers, activists, and survivors. By creating pathways for organizations to collaborate, we are able to impact human trafficking on a larger scale across Indonesia.

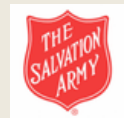

Since 2015, our coalition has grown from 3 organizations to nearly 30.



As the Dark Bali coalition has grown, so has our national visibility. In early 2021, we connected with the LPSK which is the Indonesian Witness Protection and Restitution Ministry. Collaborating with them means that the survivors coming through the Dark Bali community have access to the care and support they are legally owed by the federal government. In turn, the government is better able to pursue prosecution because survivors and their testimonies don't simply disappear once a victim escapes. This kind of partnership is critical for creating a functioning and consistent anti-trafficking response across Indonesia.



Representatives from the LPSK flew from Jakarta to Bali to attend a Task Force meeting and present their work. The group mapped plans for future collaboration in order to better care for survivors.

Most anti-trafficking resources are in English and difficult to access. Dark Bali supports and equips the Indonesian anti-trafficking community by providing professional training, giving small project grants, translating quality resources into Indonesian, identifying/ addressing current gaps in the national anti-trafficking response, and facilitating access into global anti-trafficking network.

Through increasing the capacity of the entire Indonesian anti-trafficking community, we can better serve survivors and victims and address the factors that lead to human trafficking in the country.

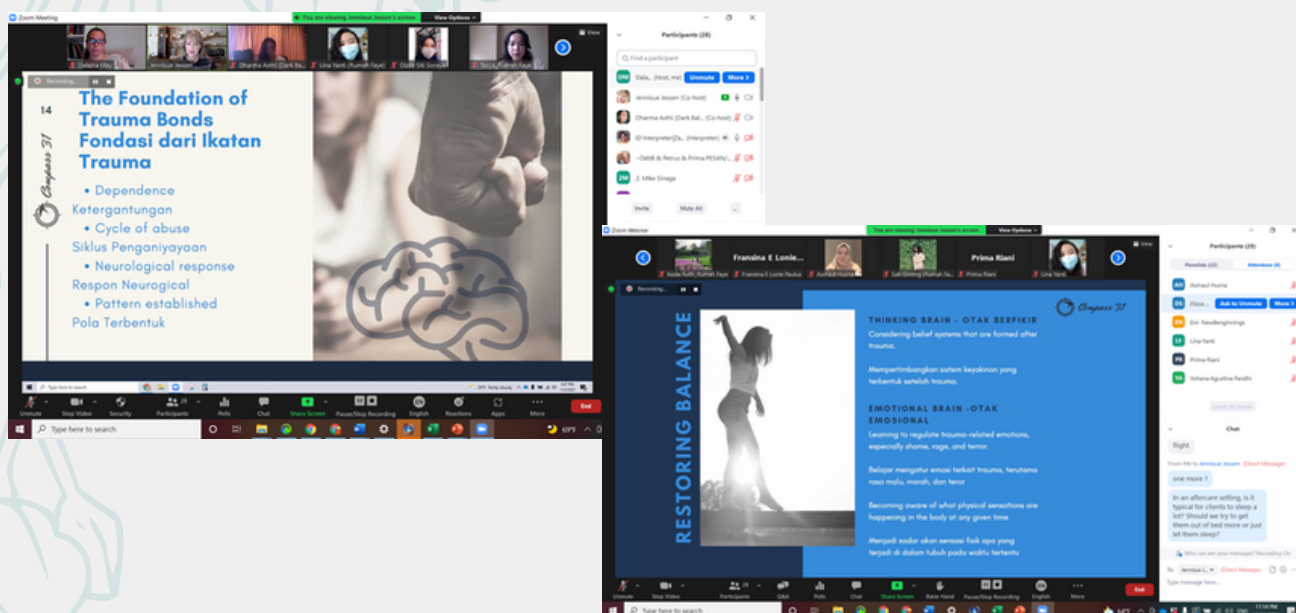

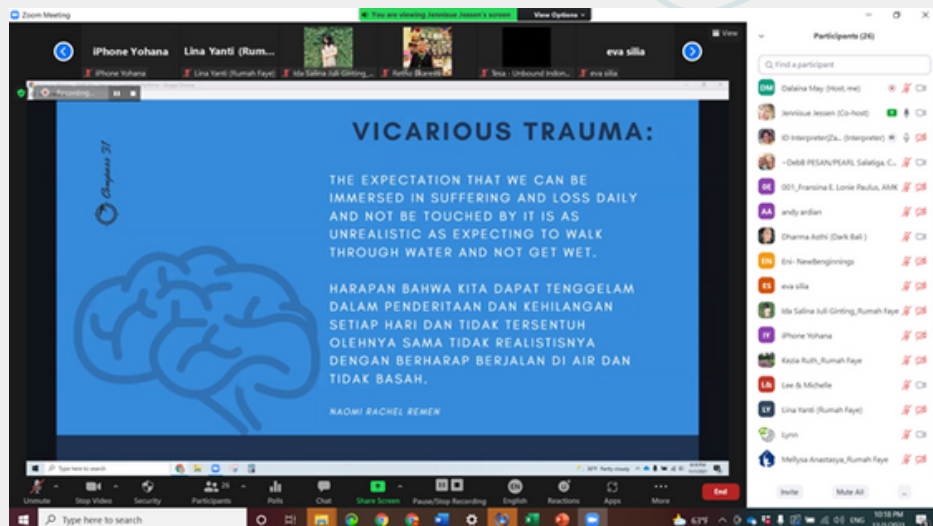
## ADVANCED TRAUMA TRAINING

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, there was no way to safely meet together in person for professional training. Instead, we piloted an online platform to bring our often requested Advanced Trauma Training workshop to 44 caregivers representing 22 organizations across the country for 5 consecutive mornings. Despite the limitations of meeting online, the training received enthusiastic feedback and is a model for taking other training seminars online in 2022.

# Our Financials

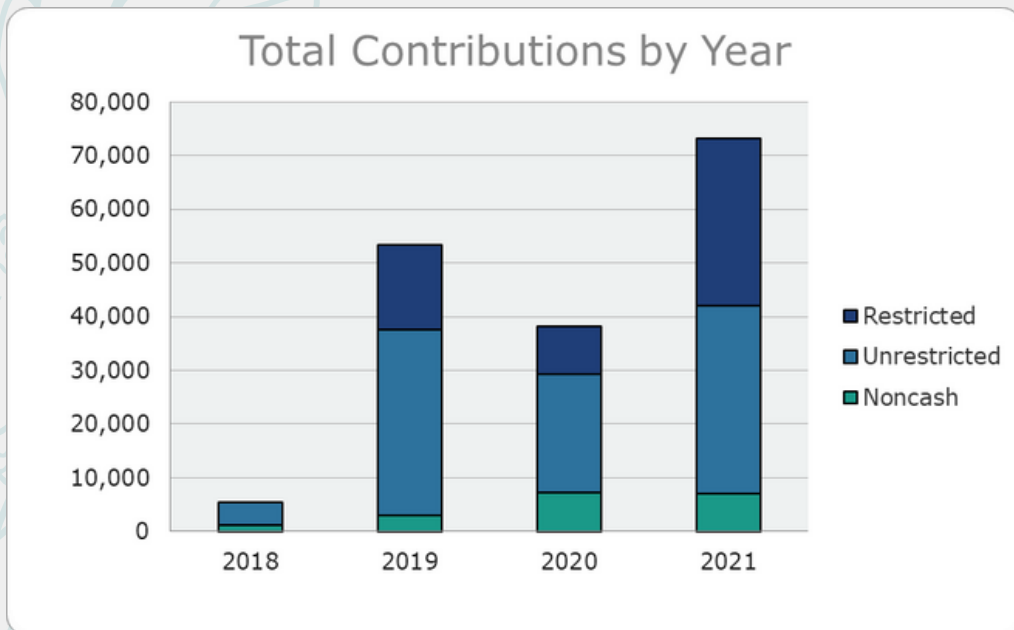

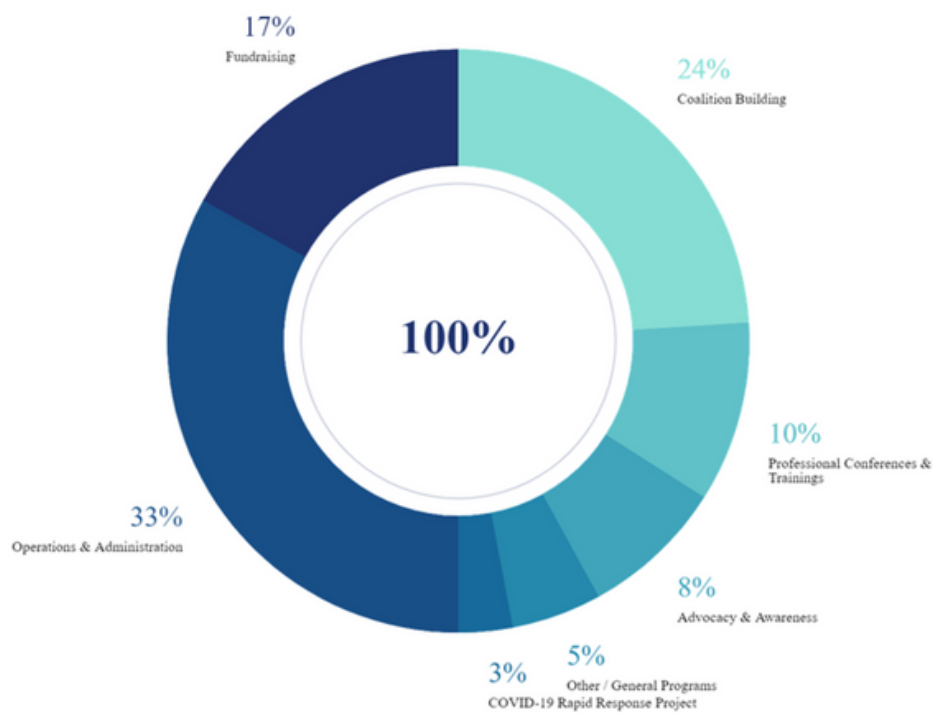

## Allocation of Expenses





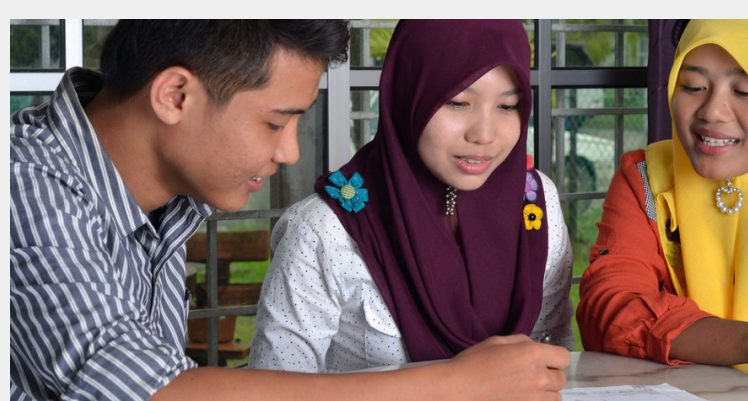
